





Growing Participation

Community college enrollments have declined every year since 2010—but the number of students under 18 has grown every year.

Accelerating State-Level Support

In 2023, state legislatures in all 50 states introduced a collective total of 527 bills related to dual enrollment.

Strengthening Partnerships

K-12 and postsecondary partners across the country are making new efforts to co-design academically rigorous dual enrollment opportunities and provide secondary-postsecondary transition supports.








Dual enrollment is a proven, evidence-based strategy to increase high school achievement and completion and to boost postsecondary enrollment and credential attainment, the use of which has grown rapidly in recent years. These opportunities can be most beneficial to students when they include core academic courses—such as a first-year English or mathematics course—as well as courses aligned to careers. Unfortunately, the opportunity to participate in dual enrollment has been limited to a small group of students, leaving too many students unable to access the benefits dual enrollment has to offer.







PARTICIPATION VARIES BY STATE









Utilize Multiple Delivery Methods and Partners

- Employ multiple delivery methods
- Increase access to dual enrollment by partnering with more than one college
- Provide transportation to higher education partner









CHALLENGE: ENGAGING LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS AND QUALITY INSTRUCTION


Enhance Course Design and Delivery

- Update instructional approaches for virtual environments
- Build in opportunities to deepen connections with instructors and peers
- Integrate proven college and career readiness strategies

CHALLENGE: SUPPORTING STUDENTS IN ACCESSING AND NAVIGATING COLLEGE COURSES

Provide targeted advising and wrap-around supports

- Support all students in accessing right-fit dual credit opportunities
- Offer resources to support course participation and engagement (e.g., technology)
- Leverage existing higher education programs:
 - Tutoring
 - Early alert systems

Staffing Strategies

Concurrent Enrollment: Dual enrollment courses taught by credentialed high school teachers at the high school

Strategies for rural communities:

- Deploy qualified instructors strategically across district high schools
- Students from multiple schools travel to another high school to take a course
- Alternative credentialing pathways for high school teachers
- Utilize employers to provide content expertise

Examples from the field:

- Texas: PSJA ISD district-wide approach includes stipends as incentives for teachers and cost saving measures
- Tennessee: co-teaching and co-grading between classroom instructors and employers



University of Massachusetts Commonwealth Collegiate Academy

Eliminates distance as a barrier for schools not located near a college campus by providing students from eligible high schools the opportunity to take UMass courses at no cost.

UMass courses taught by UMass instructors in collaboration with high school teachers Synchronous "live" online courses held during the school day leveraging different technologies


Discussion sections and project support provided by high school staff, working collaboratively with UMass instructors







Increasing College Access Network (ICAN)



Secondary and postsecondary partnerships, instructor training, and students supports

By braiding these strategies, ICAN addresses two of our most urgent educational problems:

- 1) the deep inequities in access to, and engagement and success in, high-quality dual enrollment
- 2) the lack of **SEL supports** that amplify authentic learning

ICAN Courses

- ICAN Courses incorporate Social
 Emotional Learning (SEL) into course instruction to improve the following skills in students:
 - Relationship Building
 - Growth Mindset
 - Problem-Solving
 - Self-Management
- Embed SEL strategies into synchronous and asynchronous English and math

- Building strong partnerships across education systems.




Actions to Support Dual Enrollment





Enabling Factors

- Secondary and postsecondary partnerships prioritize data sharing, regular and clear communication, and resource sharing
- Ongoing training for instructors
- Partners apply student- and equity-centered mindsets to drive innovation and problem solving



Supportive Policies



- Provide state resources, including funding models that make DE free to students and are mutually beneficial to secondary and postsecondary education systems
- Allow flexible seat-time
- Remove barriers that show up more prominently for rural students (e.g., access to technology, quality wifi, dedicated learning space)

INCREASING COLLEGE ACCESS FOR RURAL STUDENTS THROUGH DUAL ENROLLMENT INNOVATION



Actions

Student Access

- Set enrollment targets for dual enrollment courses to reflect the school community
- ✓ Design targeted recruitment approaches, including translating materials and presentations into languages spoken by students and families in the community

Student Engagement & Success


- ✓ Utilize or establish an early alert system
- Identify existing resources and new funding sources for student supports, including technology and tutoring

Partnerships

- ✓ Strategically select dual enrollment courses that will open doors and accelerate students towards degree completion
- Establish an MOU with clear roles and responsibilities and outlines goals, timelines, data sharing, supports, and funding between the college and school district

Course Delivery

- Identify training opportunities for instructors to enhance teaching methods, particularly for online courses
- Create efficiencies in credentialing high school teachers for concurrent enrollment
